TEACHER PRAYER

Dear Lord Jesus, teach us to use Your Word to bring sinners to repentance that heaven's door may be opened to them. Let me reflect Thy gracious forgiveness to all who live with me in this sinful world. Amen.

VOCABULARY

take account - examine in detail talent - a very large sum of money-10,000 talents equals millions of dollars *compassion* - have and show mercy

OUTER AIM

The Lord reveals a most forgiving heart in contrast to the hardness of human nature.

INNER AIM

Teach the children to pray the Fifth Petition with Christian understanding and deep concern for those who sin against them.

BACKGROUND

Rupprecht Bible History References, Vol. 2, pp. 225 ff.

In the verses preceding this Parable of the Unforgiving Servant, the Savior had been speaking to the disciples about their forgiving and retaining sins (the use of the Ministry of the Keys). Peter quickly came with the question, "Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Till seven times?" In response to that very human question-how often-Jesus tells the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant.

- vs. 22 Seventy times seven: an unlimited number
- vs. 23 take account: see how servants had met their responsibilities
- vs. 24 began to reckon: began to look into or examine in detail
- vs. 25 a servant whose debt was far beyond what he could ever pay
- vs. 26 the servant was unaware of his inability to pay
- vs. 27 the king forgave
- vs. 28 100 pence: how small in comparison to 10,000 talents
- vs. 33-35 contrast between merciful king and demanding servant.

PRESENTATION

Briefly review previous story as time allows. Make links to the new story when possible. Tell the story: Teachers, be encouraged to tell the story in your own words while remaining faithful to the scriptural account. When scripture records the story in more than one place, you may want to harmonize the accounts, including extra details found in each account. Let the students know where they can find the additional details in the Bible.

Discuss the story: While reviewing the major events of the story, discuss the possible applications to the students' lives. Ask questions that make them think about the story and show that they understand the story.

APPLICATION

- Reflect on the unbounded daily love that our God has shown us by forgiving us our countless sins without any merit or worthiness in us. "Forgive us our trespasses . . ." (Fifth Petition.)
- Reflect on the mercy and grace of the Lord in forgiving the sins of those who sin against us, not only seven times but seventy times seven. "As we forgive those who trespass against us." (Fifth Petition.)

PASSAGES

These passages can be assigned as memory work or simply discussed in class as to how they fit the lesson.










Introduction:

What would you do? Would it be hard to forgive them? Should you forgive them? Today we are going to learn about a man who had the chance to forgive. I want you to all listen very carefully and tell me if the man forgave his neighbor.



King

Prayer (Have the students repeat each marked section during the prayer.) Dear Father in Heaven/Help us to listen carefully/ so we can learn more from Your Word./ Help us to learn how to forgive/just like You forgave me./ In Jesus' name. Amen.

Prior to lesson the teacher should color, cut out and glue pieces of felt on the flannel graph figures. These figures can be used to tell the lesson.



While Jesus lived on this earth He told many stories to His disciples and those who followed Him. These stories were used to teach Jesus' followers about the Bible. These stories were called parables. (Students can repeat this word slowly along with the teacher.) Today we are going to hear one of these stories that Jesus told.

One day there was a king who had servants who owed him money. One of these servants owed him a very large amount of money. He owed the king 10,000 talents, that is equal to millions of dollars today.

The servant did not have the money to pay. Because he could not pay the debt the king decided to sell the man's wife, children and all the servant owned. The servant got on his knees and begged the king saying, "Master, have patience with me, and I will pay you all."

The king felt sorry for him and said he would not have to pay back any of the money. The king canceled the debt.

That servant left the king and went out and found a fellow servant that owed him money. That other servant only owed the first servant 100 denarii, which is a few dollars. This was a very small debt compared to what the first servant had owed the king. He grabbed his fellow servant and began to choke him demanding, "Pay back what you owe me!"

This other servant got down on his knees and began to beg saying, "Be patient with me and I will pay you back."

The servant refused to listen. He had his fellow servant thrown into prison until he would be able to pay back the few dollars.

Other servants saw what this servant did to his fellow servant and they went and told the king. The king was angry. The king said to the servant, "You wicked servant! I

forgave you all that debt because you begged me. Should you not also have had compassion on your fellow servant, just as I had pity on you?" The king now had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt.

After Jesus was done with the story He said that this is how our Heavenly Father will treat us if we do not forgive our brothers.

This story was told by Jesus in answer to a question that He had been asked by Peter His disciple. Who was Peter? (Peter was the disciple who had walked on water toward Jesus.) Today the question Peter asked Jesus was, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Up to seven times?"

Peter wanted to know how many times he should forgive his brother and he thought maybe up to seven times. That seemed like a lot of times to forgive one person.

(How many times do you think we should forgive those who sin against us? More than seven times? Less than seven times?)

Jesus answered him, "I do not say to you up to seven times, but seventy times seven." (How many of you know what seventy times seven is? This equals 490!) Was Jesus saying that you should count every time you forgive your brother and when you get to the 491st time you should quit?

Do you think Jesus really wants you to count every time you forgive someone? Jesus was saying that you should not count the number of times you forgive but you should always forgive no matter how many times someone sins against you. Forgiveness should be without an end.








Servant 1 Begging





(Have the students act out the story. King-bathrobe and paper crown; Servant 1 & 2; Jailers - sword and shield made of cardboard; Group of Servants. Tell the story first using the paraphrased version below. Then retell the story stopping at the appropriate times to direct the students in their roles.)

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





Servant 1 Choking Servant 2

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





The Story - Matthew 18:21-38

Matthew 18:21 Then Peter came to Him and said, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Up to seven times?"

- {22} Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you, up to seven times, but up to seventy times seven.
- {23} "Therefore the kingdom of heaven is like a certain king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. {24} "And when he had begun to settle accounts, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents. {25} "But as he was not able to pay, his master commanded that he be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and that payment be made.
- {26} "The servant therefore fell down before him, saying, 'Master, have patience with me, and I will pay you all.' {27} "Then the master of that servant was moved with compassion, released him, and forgave him the debt.
- {28} "But that servant went out and found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii; and he laid hands on him and took him by the throat, saying, 'Pay me what you owe!'
- {29} "So his fellow servant fell down at his feet and begged him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you all.'
- {30} "And he would not, but went and threw him into prison till he should pay the debt. {31} "So when his fellow servants



saw what had been done, they were very grieved, and came and told their master all that had been done.

{32} "Then his master, after he had called him, said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you begged me. {33} 'Should you not also have had compassion on your

fellow servant, just as I had pity on you?' {34} "And his master was angry, and delivered him to the torturers until he should pay all that was due to him.

{35} "So My heavenly Father also will do to you if each of you, from his heart, does not forgive his brother his trespasses."


